Pope Benedict XVI once said that "the most effective defense of the faith is the art that the Church has produced and her saints".

My brothers and sisters, as Dostoyovsky once said, "Beauty will save the world" and what the Church requires, in fact, what God through the Church requires of you, asks of you, urges of you is to manifest the beauty of the saint in the world which is so blinded by its lust that it cannot see itself nose-diving our entire generation into utter destruction. Our generation requires saints who will illumine the world with their beauty because they are God's masterful artwork, crafted in the crucible of suffering and love, to manifest his face in the world.

Jesus is calling each everyone one of us to shine the light of beauty unto this whole world so that all of humanity may give glory to our Father in heaven. The light that will shine from us comes from a life of sanctity to which we are all called—clergy and laity.

All the Christian faithful, of whatever state or rank, are called to the fullness of the Christian life and to the perfection of charity (Novo Millenio Ineunte 30)

But the beauty of the saints do not come from themselves; having been conformed to Christ by contemplating his face day in and day out, they too begin to radiate the face, the beauty of God in this world as St. Paul says:

And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being changed into his likeness from one degree of glory to another (II Cor 3,18).

In the Eucharist, we behold the glory of the Lord with unveiled faces in the deep recesses of our heart and allow him to shine there so that his light will illumine our whole being and radiate his face, his beauty that the world so desperately needs.
