OCTOBER 29, 2020 Thursday of 30th Week in OT Luke 13: 31-35

"I AM WITH YOU ALWAYS."

The Lord always invite us to gather and be with one another to share, live and love another. During His time, He invited people to listen and be with Him to gain eternal life by following Him, coming back to God through repentance and to serve others. This was the call and still the call of Jesus to us today. But how about when our faith and life were threatened, do we hide, or do we stand and face it with strength from God? How about our present situation, do we trust Him and not worry about it anymore because He said: "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age" 1? In our gospel today, Jesus Christ stand on His ground in the face of threats and dangers instigated by King Herod, the ruler of Galilee. Herod prompted to eliminate Jesus after hearing that a lot of people were going to Jesus, a threat to his influence and power.

The Lord is telling us today, do not be afraid of those people who oppose God which in the gospel Jesus called Herod a fox. "What did he mean by such an expression? The fox was regarded as the cleverest of all animals and one of the most destructive as well. Any farmer will tell you how difficult it is to get rid of foxes who under the cover of night steal and destroy. The fox became a symbol of what was worthless, insignificant, and destructive. It takes great courage to stand up and openly oppose a tyrant. Jesus knew that he would suffer the same fate as the prophets who came before him. He not only willingly exposed himself to such danger, but he prayed for his persecutors and for those who rejected the prophets who spoke in God's name." Again, Jesus is showing us how to deal with those who persecute, ridicule or oppose us. He is not the Lord of revenge and harm but a Lord of love and compassion. He even teaches us to pray for our

Let us ask our Lord that we may have the strength necessary to follow Him amidst difficulties, dangers, and anxiety and let the words of Jesus be our guide: "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."
